



Religious studies in ASC schools provide students with the opportunity to think deeply, critically and meaningfully about the world in which they live.

Exploring new ideas and engaging with new experiences are critical elements of the Cobram AGS RAVE curriculum and in recent classes I have had the pleasure of seeing many of our students demonstrate a willingness to move outside their comfort zone and participate enthusiastically in various conversations and activities with open and inquiring minds. Today I would like to share some of these memorable moments with you.

On Tuesday we welcomed Ross Smith and Keith Parry, friends from St Margaret's Anglian Parish, to Cobram AGS to address our Year Seven cohort. Ross and Keith were visiting as representatives of the Gideons who are an international association dedicated to spreading the word of God. One of the ways in which they do this is by gifting a pocket size New Testament and Psalms Bible each year to all Year Seven students across Australia. In his address to our students Ross reminded our cohort that where ever they were on their faith journey, they may find "help" with some of their everyday worries in the words of the New Testament and Psalms. I was delighted to see all of our students gratefully accept their gift.

On Wednesday students in the Community Service Pathway Elective continued their program with visits to Irvin House and PALS. The purpose of the visits were to get to know some of the residents and participants and join in the leisure activities. At Irvin House the boys enjoyed a game of bingo and a lovely afternoon tea. The group visiting PALS spent time familiarising themselves with the facility and making new friends. As has been the case throughout the semester thus far, our students conducted themselves wonderfully and took the opportunity to immerse themselves in the program.

Finally, during a lesson with my Year 7B students last week, we were discussing stories from various religions. I posed the question to them 'if you were God, what would you want the world to know?' Here are some of their responses – I hope you enjoy them as much as I did!



...And so, that's a wrap!



CAREERS With Ms Jade Drew

What a busy start to Term Two we have had. It has been wonderful to meet plenty of new faces whilst I have been settling into my new role in the Careers hub at Cobram AGS.

Here are a few pointers for students and parents to reflect & review:

The role of parents as careers supporters - Help your child to achieve their goal

There is much evidence that shows that Parents and Carers play a significant role in their child's education and career decisions. You are the greatest influence on your children's career choice. The "world of work" is complex and making careers decisions may be challenging, that's why starting career conversations early helps to promote and encourage lifelong learning and personal development.

Think about it: throughout life, we've always been encouraged to learn and expand our capacity to build a better future for ourselves.

But how involved should you be in this decision-making process? Should you adopt a hands-on role? What is the best advice you can give your child? Remember the workplace your children may enter may be very different from where you started working.

Some strategies to help with career conversations and career related learning- Be positive

The world of work is very complexed and ever changing, the future isn't a fixed destination. Help your child plan for a dynamic rather than a static future. Gone are the days when we had a job for life, we are now moving into a life of jobs.

The majority of school leavers now have access to an array of educational, and vocational pathway opportunities so their options are vast.

When having career conversations with your child, try to avoid "what are you going to be/do when you leave school?" type questions, instead change it to something broader and less defined, it provides for more creativity and encourages out-of-the-box thinking. Why not try "Who are you and how can you leave your mark? Or "What is your professional purpose?







CAREERS With Ms Jade Drew

Help develop positive self-esteem

Focus on encouraging your child's talents and achievements not just at school, but at home, participating in sport and out in the community. Acknowledge their efforts in everything they do even if they think they have not succeeded.

Give your child jobs, create exposure to careers. Creating age appropriate jobs for your child helps them to link what they are doing to an occupation.

Just show you believe in them!

Allow for a change in direction

The chances of your child expressing an interest in a career or job at an early age and then pursuing it into the long-term future of work life is relatively low. Encourage your child to explore their options and experience different things. Making suggestions of careers to explore based on the skills and values you see in them.

Sharing is caring

Share your journey and the pathways you took to get to where you are and why you chose them and also any problems you faced along the way. Don't just talk about the positives, make sure you also talk about the negatives. This helps for them to link real experiences with their own visions.

The most important thing is to be supportive and encouraging of their life, loves and learnings. Enjoy the journey with them.
