



20 YEARS | MRS TRICIA SECCULL

Service at Cobram AGS

At a recent gathering of teachers from Cobram Anglican Grammar School, Cathedral College Wangaratta and Trinity Anglican College Albury, Mrs Patricia Seccull was presented with her 20 Year Service Award. The Reverend Peter Laurence OAM, CEO of the Anglican Schools Commission made the presentation to Tricia in front of her very proud and respectful colleagues.

Tricia began teaching at Christ the King Anglican College (now Cobram Anglican Grammar School) 22 years ago when the school opened in 2000. At the time of opening, the school had a total of 24 enrolments across 4 classrooms.



Over her time at Cobram AGS Tric has taught RAVE (Religious and Values Education), PE, Health, Community Service, Maths, English, Humanities, Commerce and VCE Business Management. When prompted for a few brief reflections on her time at Cobram AGS, Trish offered the following comments.

'I often refer to CAGS as MY school and I state that most proudly. Although its growth was slower than was initially hoped for, CAGS is now recognised in the area as a worthy place of learning, with a sound reputation and I am extremely honoured to have been part of the school from its beginnings.'

'I would like to express how grateful I am to have been entrusted with the important role of educating so many fine young people, the support which has been afforded to me by many parents throughout those years and the professional assistance and encouragement by my employers and colleagues.'

All at Cobram AGS congratulate Tric for her fine service, not only within school but also the wider community. Congratulations Tric and thank you for your wonderful contributions.

Our chapel services this term have been devoted to learning a little about our school hymn 'Be Thou My Vision'.

Students in both the senior and junior schools were given the opportunity to develop their understanding of how the melody and lyrics have been developed over history. I thought I would take the opportunity to share some of that history with you today.

The story begins with St Patrick, who, through unfortunate circumstances was sold into slavery in Ireland when he was a young man. During this time, he became a Christian. On Easter Sunday in 433, in defiance of an order from the local king which forbade the lighting of a flame or candle, Patrick climbed to the top of the tallest hill in the area and lit a fire. He wanted people to see God's light shining in the darkness. As the local people woke early that morning, they were witness to Patrick's act of bravery in order to express his Christian faith. Years later, an unknown composer wrote a melody in honour of Patrick's act. It was called "Slane," after the hill where Patrick lit his fire: Slane Hill.

It is believed the Lyrics of 'Be Thou My Vision' were written in Gaelic by a sixth century Irish poet known as St. Dallan. The poem was translated into English in 1905, some 1500 years after it was written. There is a suggestion the first line "Be thou my vision" was inspired by the fact that St Dallan was blind. Other lyrics remind us that no matter when, day or night Christ can be our guiding light, can always be with us. The middle verse requests that God be a defensive support, a shield to protect us and a place for us to shelter. Another verse introduces the idea of God as an "inheritance" and a "treasure". We already have the riches of God so we need not be waiting for the "riches" of the world, nor for the vanity of "man's empty praise." The final verse reminds us that whatever happens, with Christ and love in our heart we will have joy.

During our Chapel Services, I asked the students to think about 'Be thou my vision' as a prayer, a prayer that Christ could be our vision—our best thought—our presence—our light.

Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart Naught be all else to me, save that thou art,

Thou my best thought, by day or by night,

Waking or sleeping, thy presence my light,

Be thou my wisdom, and thou my true word.

I ever with thee and thou with me, Lord Thou my great Father, and I thy true son.

Thou in me dwelling and I with thee one,

Be Thou my battle shield, Sword for the fight,

Be Thou my dignity, Thou my delight, Thou my soul's shelter, Thou my high tower

Raise Thou me heavenward, O Power of my power

Riches I heed not, nor man's empty praise

Thou mine inheritance, now and always

Thou and thou only first in my heart High King of heaven, my treasure thou art

High King of heaven, after victory won May I reach heaven's joys, O bright heaven's sun

Heart of my own heart, whatever befall Still be my vision, O ruler of all. Cobram & G G



Last week the Year 5/6 classes worked really hard on their Inquiry projects about Countries of the World.



Mr Willett was also very impressed with 5/6L's speeches, well done everyone on some terrific Inquiry work!














The Crier SENIOR SCHOOL REPORT


