




















JUNIOR SCHOOL REPORT

Cows Create Careers (CCC)

Year 9 Cows Create Careers students completed a unit in Second Semester that aimed to increase the awareness of dairy industry careers in a very hands-on way: students rear and care for two three-week-old calves at their school.

Each school is provided with dairy industry curriculum, at no cost. A local dairy farmer teaches the students how to care for the calves, while an Industry Advocate visits the students to speak about their career in the dairy industry. Students are required to form teams to complete assessments based on the dairy industry.

As part of the unit, the year 9 students ventured down to the Year 3/4 L class towards the end of the year to present information on raising calves and the dairy and beef industries. The CCC students prepared information to share to the younger students including topics such as careers, safety on farms, calf nutrition, cattle diseases, showing cattle, how to milk a cow, various productions derived from cattle and the different breeds in Australia. Both classes then also helped prepare the milk for the calves down at the school's Ag Centre. It was another great initiative where our sub-schools could integrate together and had our younger students learning from our older ones, getting a taste of what sort of electives our Middle School students get to be a part of.

Our CCC students also attended their completion excursion where they spent the day in Shepparton with other schools in the North and North-Eastern parts of Victoria to view other schools projects. They spent the day learning more about the dairy industry, manure scores and how this relates to the health of calves, the nutrients in milk and how this strengthens out lives, various careers choices in the industry and winners of the CCC submissions were announced.

Our group 'King Kows', which included Austin Lukies, Regan Fox, Ben Ackerly, Keia Towler and Nick Arnold took out third prize in the Senior School division from the North and North-Eastern areas for their lego farm safety model and letter to the dairy industry.
